RECAP AERS Spring Meeting, Mar. 14-16 University of North Carolina Coastal Studies Institute, Wanchese NC

The theme for the Spring 2015 AERS Meeting was "Blue Carbon," and addressed the potential for estuarine carbon sequestration to achieve a "carbon neutral future." Estuarine ecosystems sequester blue (seagrasses, marshes and mangroves), green (phytoplankton) and black carbon (product of incomplete combustion or refractory carbon in peat, sediments and mud-These estuarine carbon sinks are not included in most carbon storage models, but may be some of the best ways we have to achieve a carbon neutral future. We invited three Keynote Speakers to talk to us about carbon storage in estuaries. Dr. Hans Paerl (UNC-Chapel Hill, Institute of Marine Science), emphasized the difficulty of making carbon budgets in estuaries due to large perturbations such as hurricanes and floods which can cause large phytoplankton blooms and to many perturbations on small time and space scales which affect the balance between photosynthesis and respiration.

Dr. Robert Twilley (*Louisiana Sea Grant / LSU*) told us his story of measuring "mangroves and mud" (shoots and roots) for carbon storage, revising methods to measure the carbon in roots (not a constant proportion of shoot carbon and need to dig deeper), and understanding the carbon entering and leaving mangrove systems via uplands and estuaries. **Dr. Sid Mitra** (*East Carolina University*) emphasized that the black carbon pool is probably as substantial as the blue carbon pool. We don't have answers for how much carbon is stored by estuaries by different components, but the framework to answer these questions is being actively pursued. We also arranged a series of contributed sessions: 1) Camp Lejune, 2) Ecosystems, 3) SAV, Shellfish & Finfish, 4) Carbon & Climate.
